A. Gratitude is often revealed in great generosity. "And Zacchae	eus stood and said to the Lord,

- "Behold, Lord, the half of my goods I give to the poor. And if I have defrauded anyone of anything, I restore it fourfold." And Jesus said to him, "Today salvation has come to this house, since he also is a son of Abraham." (Luke 19:8–9)
- B. Gratitude is motivated by God's generosity toward us. "For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sake he became poor, so that you by his

 - A. Faith demands humility because it is not a work. Faith is a response to the prompting of the Holy Spirit opening our eyes to our state of sinfulness and the reality of what Christ has done. "For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, not a result of works, so that no one may boast." (Ephesians 2:8–9)
 - B. Pride keeps us from Christ. Many of us are uncomfortable with gifts unless it is Christmas and birthdays, even on these occasion we can be uncomfortable if we believe the gift is too expensive. We are hardwired to contribute to our salvation.

To have humility, then, is to understand our origins and our place in the world, to have an accurate sense of who and what we are. Thus, virtuous humility isn't just a matter of acknowledging our limitations and weaknesses; it recognizes gifts and strengths, too. Humility is an accurate assessment of oneself in relation to the world and to God.
